

Safety Tools, Equipment and Supplies—Venue Considerations

Trained Lifeguards

- Rescue/paddle boards
 - o If not assigned to other safety boat, waterfront, or land station
- Identifiable lifeguard uniforms
- Whistles
- Pocket face masks (breathing masks)
- Deployable Life Vests/Jackets
- Personal Floatation Devices (e.g., rescue tubes, fun/wacky neodles, rescue cans, tethered ring buoys, throw-able/deployable retriever, etc)
- Snorkel
- Swim Fins
- Swim Goggles
- Sunscreen Lotion
- Sunglasses
- Hydration/Water-filled Bottles
- Portable, verified fully battery-charged FRS2-way radios
- Binoculars
- "Marker buoy"
- Fanny/Hip Packs
- Standard First Aid Kits
- Biohazard eleanup kits
- Protective gloves (e.s., latex, nitrile, grip)
- AT Lifeguard Land Base Station(s)
 - Cardiac Care Devices AEDs; respiratory resuscitation apparatuses
 - Backboard / spinal immobilization unit
 - o Blankets
 - o Fog/Bull Horn
 - o Lightning Detector (hand-held, portable)

Trained Safety Monitors ("Spotters")

- Identifiable spotter uniform
- Personal Floatation Device(s)
- Life Vests/Jackets and possibly hard hat (when in kayaks or row boats)
- Sunscreen
- Portable, verified fully battery-charged FRS 2-way radios

Part 2: Open Water Safety Requirements and Guidelines

- Binoculars
- Hydration/Water-filled Bottles
- Whistles (potentially)

Non-Transport, Onsite, Land Based

- Near start/finish and boat off-ramp areas.
- Staffed with at least two qualified professionals on standby (EMTs, nurses, etc)

Non-Prescription Treatment Supplies

- At least two (2) Cardiac defibrillators (or AEDs) Note: AED Automatic External Defibrillator
- Trauma kits
- Oxygen, with masks
- Pocket facemasks to allow rescue breathing without contamination
- Asthma inhaler/bronchodilator
- First aid kits to include supplies for lacerations
- Biohazard cleanup kits
- Sterile Water (# of Cases of 500 cc, etc.)
- Gauze Rolls (2", 4", etc)
- Gauze Pads (2"x2", 4"x4", etc)
- Band-Aids (3", 4.5", butterflys, etc)
- 1" Tape Rolls
- Exam Gloves (M, L, X
- Splash Caps
- Irrigation Cap for Water
- Zip Lock Snack Bag
- Zip Lock Sandwich Bag
- Zip Lock Gallon Bag
- Assorted Storage Totes
- Tall, Large Ground First Aid Station Flags "First Aid"
- "First Aid" / "Medical Tent" Signs
- Glucose tablets (or similar)
- Hydration fluids
- Potable Ice
- Ice Coolers
- Potable Water
- Drink Cups
- Blankets

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Prescription Treatment Supplies

- Epinephrine pen**
- Diphenhydramine (for example, Benadryl) **
- Medications for treatment of seizure **
- Intravenous fluids (including ability to rapidly cool with chilled IV fluid in hot weather) **
- IV needles/equipment (including large bore (18-20 gauge) needles) **
- Other prescription medications and treatments**
 - ** If needed, ALS or other offsite Ambulance (and/or other qualified interceptors) is emergent requested by the Event Medical Officer to supply and administer presciption medications or treatments using established protocols.

Supporting Tools and Equipment

- Large Cooling Tents and/or Heating Canopy Tents (with optional side panels)
 - Misting Fans
 - Water hose
 - o Hose water supply
 - Space Heaters
- Exam Tables / beds or gurneys
- Exam Chairs
- Electrical power supply outlets (sufficient number of outlets GFCIs, & wattage capacities)
- Electrical power extension cords (safety-rated, surge protection, ample number & lengths, and anti-trip-hazard installed)
